Qualification Subjects



The following subjects count toward the **Partial Qualification Q** at the GISW: **36 semester grades** are required.

Required Subjects

German (4 semester grades)

Mathematics (4 semester grades)

One Foreign Language/Lang. of host country (4 semester grades)

Natural Sciences (min. 4 semester grades)

Field of Studies: Social Studies (min. 4 semester grades)

of those in History (min. 2 semester grades)

Artistic field of Study (min. 3 semester grades)

Physical Education (max. 3 semester grades)



Qualification Subjects



In the 5 Exam Subjects all 4 semester grades will count!!!

In the Field of Study **Foreign Languages/ Natural Sciences** at least **14 semester grades** will be counted.

When counting achievements in one subject, a minimum of **2** semesters have to be counted.

Examination Subjects - DIA



The 5 Examination Subjects must cover the 3 Fields of Study.

The written Exams must cover 2 fields of study.



Examination Subjects - DIA



Students are required to have been enrolled in each written examination subject starting in 9th grade.

1. written exam subject: German

2. written exam subject: Mathematics or Advanced FL / host country language

3. written exam subject: Mathematics or Advanced FL / host country language

History or Social Studies or

Biology <u>or</u> Physics <u>or</u> Chemistry

4./ 5. oral exam subject: Student's choice, cannot be one of the written exam

subjects and has to have been part of their studies since

10th grade. One oral exam has to be taken in German.

Foreign Languages can make up a max of 50%, where exams in a FL count as a whole and exams in a bilingual subject count half.

The 5th Exam is a Presentation Exam.



The 5th Element – Exam #5



Basics





The 5th Element – Exam #5



Testing communicative competencies using a controversial topic.

(i.e. Question or Hypothesis)



20 Minute Duration: 10 Minutes each for media-supported presentation and discussion



Student prooves a **deep** understanding with a **topic of his or her choice**.





Everything at its time...



At least eight weeks before the exam, the student provides **two** topics of his or her choice.

There and back again...





Everything at its time...



Four weeks before the exam, the student receives the topic that the examiner chose out of the provided options.

From now on, the examiner is not allowed to counsel or support the student.

Two days before the exam, the student turns in a short documentation of his or her presentation (max length two pages).

The short documentation is **NOT** graded.



Everything at its time...



Right BEFORE the exam, the presentation is saved by the school for the record!!!





Other items that have changed



New Guidelines of the DIA Exam Regulations "Klausuren"

In every subject **except** German, English, Math and 2. FL only **one** test (Klausur) needs to be written per semester.

BUT: 50% test (Klausur) and 50% participation remains!!!



As of **modern** Foreign Languages in Q1 (11th gr.), the test (Klausur) is replaced by testing the competencies through *Speaking* or *Listening Comprehension* or through *Listening-Viewing-Comprehension*.
